



## Pity For Poor Africans



Is almost enough to draw pity from stones.



I pity them greatly, but I must be mum,

It has been calculated, that if one tenth of the inhabitants of this country abstained from the use of West India sugar, and used East India, their influence in discouraging slave-labour, and encouraging free-labour, would be sufficient to abolish slavery in the West Indies.

May every man, before he indulges his appetite with the blood-bought luxury, reflect upon the price it cost. Not eightpence, or tenpence, or twelvepence, or fourteenpence the pound only; but groans, and wounds, and death. As he sweetens his tea, let him reflect on the bitterness at the bottom of the cup. Let him bring the subject home to his heart, and say, as he truly may, this lump cost the poor slave a groan,—and this, a bloody stroke with the cart-whip;—and this, perhaps, worn down by fatigue and wretchedness and despair, he sunk under his misery and died! And then let him swallow his beverage with what appetite he may.

Let every one remember that by using his exertions for the abolition of slavery, he may prevent the perpetration of innumerable crimes. How few,
