"The worldwide church" Senior church leaders want to hear your views!


Kingston Episcopal Area Youth Forum 27 June 2022 5pm-6.15pm by zoom

In July and August this year, bishops from all over the world will be coming to Canterbury for the 'Lambeth Conference' to listen to each other's views on what it means to be 'God's Church for God's World' in the 21st Century. I will be among them and, if you are aged 13-18 and either a student at a Southwark church school or a member of one of our church youth groups, I should like to hear your views before I go.

The bishops at the Conference will be discussing how the church in their own country or region is responding to the big challenges of life today including the environment, poverty, the pandemic and how to build bridges between science and faith. We shall be trying hard to understand many different viewpoints and to hear how God wants us to serve his world. So this really is a good opportunity for you to make your views heard.

However, the bishops will be in Canterbury for 10 days and the Youth Forum meeting lasts just over one hour! So I should particularly like to focus in particular on how you would like the Church to respond to issues relating to *Peace and Reconciliation* and *Politics and Justice*.

Other senior church leaders hope to join me to listen to what you have to say (see below) so this really is an opportunity for your voice to be heard. Further details on how to take part are attached and I do hope very much to see you there.



The Lambeth Conference

The Church of England is just one member of a global family of national and regional churches in more that 165 countries.

Together, those churches are called 'The Anglican Communion' and tens of millions of Christians are members. There is great diversity among the churches and, although the Archbishop of Canterbury does not exercise authority outside the Church of England, they all recognise him as a focus for unity and the spiritual head of the Anglican Communion.



Each of the churches in the Anglican Communion has its own structure. Overall there are 865 dioceses and 77 archbishops. There are also over 1000 bishops because many dioceses have more than one; in the Diocese of Southwark, for example, there are four.

With so many members and ways of doing things, it helps for everyone to get together sometimes. So, in 1867, Archbishop Charles Longley invited all the 144 bishops who were then in the Anglican Communion to meetings at Lambeth Palace, which remains today the home of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Only 76 turned up but there were 100 when the next archbishop held another event in 1878 and numbers gradually increased till, at the 1998 Lambeth Conference, there were 749 including, for the first time, 11 women bishops.

The Fifteenth Lambeth Conference had to be postponed in 2020 because of the pandemic and bishops from across the Anglican Communion will now meet in person at Canterbury between 27th July and 7th August 2022.

However, the first phase of the conference has started already because bishops from around the world have been meeting online since July 2021 to explore the conference theme of what it means to be "God's Church for God's World". When they meet in Canterbury they will get into more detail, try to understand what God wants for his world, and hopefully come to some agreements about ways forward.

Then when they go home afterwards to all the corners of the earth, they will know that they are "listening, walking and witnessing together" as they work in their communities to progress God's hopes for the world in the generation ahead.
