## Letter from Our President

## Dear Friends,

So in the current climate, what can we do to prevent branches from closing down and how can we resuscitate dead ones or even think of opening new branches. The real question is how do we want to re-imagine MU in our diocese? Many suggestions have been made in the past, like changing time of meeting, moving to joint leadership roles, ensuring that members who over many years were faithful and are now unable to pay their subscription, should not lose their membership.

I am grateful to Bishop Christopher for introducing us to the Communications department in the diocese. We have had time to meet with Vernia Mengot, the Editor and Communications Manager, to look at the various ways and possibilities of how MU in the diocese can be re-imagined. We have plans to take a new look at our prisons' work, as we partner with the diocese and what new innovations can take place. There are lots of ideas and plans of what we can do.

In Ezekiel 3:1-14, we read about the valley of dry bones where God assures Prophet Ezekiel that dead bones will rise. Yes let us rise and breathe new life into our MU, so that together we can spread the good news of Jesus to our families and communities, in doing this, through prayers and actions, we will see transformed people.

As I write, we are now in the season of Lent, that time of the Christian calendar when we remember the 40 days leading to the death and resurrection of JESUS CHRIST. I pray that for each one of us, whatever we choose to do, it will not be another ritual but an intentional time of prayer, seeking and listening to God and doing acts of Mercy.

We have just had our Lent Quiet Day, ably led by our chaplain the Revd. Esther Foss, exploring Peace, Growth and Awakening. For each of these, there was the constant reminder that Jesus is always there calling us to follow. One of the quotes we had was a quote from Pope Francis:

"Lent comes to make its prophetic appeal, to remind us that it is possible to create something new within ourselves and around us..."

Finally, we have begun to hear the joyful song of the birds, daffodils etc beginning to show colours to tell us that spring is around, what will you be growing in your garden this spring/summer? How marvellous that a little seed, a little soil and water bring abundant life and joy when it grows.

As we continue faithfully our journey with God in this year 2023, I pray that each one of us will experience God in a new way. I conclude with this prayer taken from the Platinum Prayer book:

"Lord Jesus, May we be inspired by your life of service and follow in your way To learn to selflessly serve you and our neighbour To be more thoughtful and respectful of others. To be ever observant and ever alert to others' needs To be wise and sensitive helpers – and, in our daily lives, doing all things through love as we serve you Lord. Amen."
