Revised Diocesan Environment Policy

Presentation by the Bishop of Kingston and Head of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation, and moved by the Bishop of Kingston that:

"THIS SYNOD endorses the renewed Diocesan Environment Policy 2024-2027 as recommended by the Diocesan Council of Trustees."

Introduction

 The Diocesan Environment Policy, as approved by the Diocesan Synod in 2021, is reviewed every three years. A large amount of work and success has taken place, endorsed by Synod through this Policy. This includes in areas such as Eco Diocese, Net Zero, parish training and support. This updated Policy takes account of Southwark Vision 2024-2035, but remains close to the 2021 version and we will be asking Synod to endorse and renew the Diocese's commitments. The Policy was reviewed and recommended by the Policy & Finance Committee and the Diocesan Council of Trustees.

Background

- 2. The Diocese has built a strong foundation for safeguarding the integrity of the Earth. Across the Diocese we see the many ways in which celebration of creation as well as efforts to safeguard it are being lived out in our schools, churches, cathedral and Diocese as a whole. We acknowledge that this is journey and that we will have to continue be intentional, persistent and consistent in our approach.
- 3. The Diocese has committed to working towards the Church of England goal of achieving Net Zero Carbon by 2030 but with an awareness that this might not be achievable in all cases, and so having a backstop date of 2035 for those buildings where 2030 is not achieved. We think this is the right balance of ambition and realism.
- 4. The Diocese of Southwark has made good progress, gaining its Eco Diocese Bronze Award status in 2023 well ahead of its 2025 target. To achieve the Eco Diocese Silver status there will be various structural areas that need to be reviewed. This includes gaining a further award for the Diocesan office which currently has a Bronze Award, , looking at finance and investments, and considering the use of land relating to biodiversity and carbon reduction. The biggest challenge in achieving the Eco Silver Award will be attaining the necessary level of awards for churches. This work is overseen by the Eco Diocese Working Group, chaired by Bishop Martin and reporting to the Diocese Secretary and Bishop Christopher.

Key Points of the proposed revised policy

5. This Policy relates to the Priority of Healing in the <u>Southwark Vision</u> that in active stewardship and commitment to safeguarding the earth we acknowledge that this can have a direct impact on challenging the injustice of poverty and that in all actions big and small we can work towards healing the Earth. We acknowledge that God has given it to us to enjoy and steward well.





- 6. It is proposed that we renew our commitment to the Eco Diocese programme and our goal of achieving an Eco Diocese Silver Award by 2027/28. As part of this we continue our work to support churches to become Eco Church award holders themselves using the scheme as an effective way to embed good eco stewardship across the life and breadth of Diocese.
- 7. It is proposed to include the additional statement of commitment that the Diocese will show due consideration in its review of land as pertains to biodiversity and carbon reduction. This reflects the updated A Rocha Eco Diocese criteria.
- 8. In support of the Net Zero Carbon strategy, we commit to make best efforts to achieve the Church of England ambition of being net zero by 2030. Though we make this commitment we also acknowledge the challenges in achieving this and have 2035 as a backstop net zero target. We fully expect that many of our churches and schools will achieve the 2030 target.

A greener vision for our diocese

Caring for Creation is a key part of our discipleship, honouring God as we steward and safeguard the integrity of the Earth that has been entrusted to us. A priority in Southwark Vision 2024–2035 – **Christ Centred | Outward Focused** – is healing. We believe, through little and large actions, we can support the healing of the Earth. We understand that the Earth, through nature, is to be enjoyed and demonstrates in its very creation the handiwork of God. We also believe that care of creation will directly support the tackling of poverty in its various forms globally and locally.

Healing – a Southwark Vision priority: We will seek God's healing for our communities and our world. Christ's call for healing and reconciliation requires us to grapple with many of the issues that we face including safeguarding, social justice, racial justice and care for creation. Working to achieve our shared goal of achieving Net Zero Carbon by 2030.

Principles

The Diocese of Southwark is committed to a direction of travel which values and honours the earth and all its biodiversity as part of God's Kingdom, and which seeks to safeguard this for future generations. This means that we will seek to adhere to three core principles in everything we do:

- 1. Treading lightly on the earth, being always mindful of the environment and the care of creation in our decision-making and action.
- 2. Remembering that the earth is a gift of God to be shared with all creatures, and so take only what we need, ensuring enough for all.
- 3. Valuing the earth that shelters and sustains us and speaking up for the voiceless: those suffering the worst effects of climate change and the earth itself.





Living our commitment to creation

Every parish, school, diocesan and bishops' office, and individual will seek to embody these principles in different ways, working together as a diverse fellowship to make God's Kingdom present on earth as it is in Heaven. Some congregations are working to achieve Eco Church awards, contributing to the Southwark Diocese target of achieving an Eco Diocese Silver Award by 2027/8, and all parishes and places of worship are encouraged to join the Eco Church movement. Others speak out against climate injustice or have individuals who are knowledgeable and passionate about sustainable lifestyle choices.

The Southwark Diocesan Board of Education will continue to build on their schools' substantial success in addressing these principles within their curriculum, ensuring that there is relevant training to encourage schools and their local church congregation to work together to secure Eco Church awards and to maximise their own commitment and response to this diocesan pledge.

We recognise that there will be some areas of work where the diocese can make its own decisions and set its own policies, and other areas where we are encouraging, helping and enabling others within the autonomy of their own remits. This is in keeping with the diocesan approach of **Lead, Enable, Serve** and ensuring that those involved remain key stakeholders and included as key partners in meetings and strategy formation.

Our diocese commits to...

- + Embedding care for creation in our worship and ministerial training, and encouraging all parishes to include reference to the Fifth Mark of Mission in their Mission Action Planning.
- + Encouraging all parishes, schools and places of worship to embrace environmental themes in their worship pattern throughout the liturgical year.
- + Where we have direct influence, taking environmental impact (emissions, waste and sustainability) and use of resources into account in our work, decision-making, travel, projects and programmes, and encouraging parishes and schools to embed this in their preaching, worship, decisionmaking, travel, and buildings maintenance.
- + Subject to resources, developing a plan to maintain our vicarages to be as environmentally friendly and low-carbon as possible.
- + Showing due consideration of the use of our land as pertains to biodiversity and carbon reduction.
- + Developing structures to support a greener future, including how to enable deaneries to provide local environmental support to parishes, for example through a network of Area Environmental Champions.

- + Campaigning for wider change, raising our voices to influence policymakers in local and national government measuring and reducing our carbon emissions, working with Archdeacons, parishes, schools and deaneries, to achieve net zero carbon before the Government target of 2050.
- + To make best efforts to achieve the Church of England ambition of being net zero by 2030. Whilst making this commitment we also acknowledge the significant challenges in achieving this and have 2035 as a backstop net zero target, by when we must have fully overcome these challenges and achieved net zero. We fully expect that many of our churches and schools will achieve the 2030 target.
- + Achieving the *A Rocha* Silver Eco Diocese award by 2027/28, building on our current Bronze award foundation. Thereafter working towards a Gold Award, and as part of this supporting and encouraging all our parishes to achieve Eco Church awards.
- + Collaborating with a wide range of colleagues, both lay and ordained, to inspire and encourage all individuals in the diocese to adapt their ways of living to minimise their impact on the environment, providing resources to support all church members to make care for creation central to how they choose to live.

"Caring for our world is not just a duty – it is a joy and a privilege. Sometimes we may feel disheartened at the magnitude of the challenges facing our society and our world, but we can celebrate the fact that we can now do more than ever before to bless, tend and steward the great gifts entrusted to us our by our Creator God.

The first step in taking our calling as stewards of creation seriously is to open our eyes to see the possibilities before us. These may seem few or minor, but if taken seriously they can make a huge impact over time. If we seek to be faithful in the small things as well as the big, we can trust that God will honour our efforts, even as he holds the bigger picture. We do so not just for ourselves, our communities and our children, but for our global friends and neighbours, knowing that they are already paying the greater cost of climate change."
