We are committed to becoming a younger and more diverse diocese – one which better reflects the communities we serve.

D Deepening our discipleship

Christ is at the heart of our faith – and we will seek to go deeper in our journey with him, replicating our learning and sharing our gifts and resources.

H Healing

We will seek God's healing for our communities and our world, prioritising safeguarding, social justice, racial justice and care for creation.



What is a Deanery Synod?

A Deanery Synod is the coming together of your local parishes forming bridges in the local community. They are the intermediary between each PCC and the Diocesan Synod. They focus on mission and ministry and mutual areas of concern and interest, providing a channel for information sharing through presentations, discussions and debate.

Occasionally, Deanery Synod members will also make decisions on behalf of the wider deanery. They also form the electorate for Diocesan and General Synod elections. Elections to General Synod next take place in autumn 2026. Becoming elected to a Deanery Synod is therefore not only significant locally, but also for the wider Church. The Diocesan Synod and General Synod may also refer matters to the Deanery Synod for consideration and feedback.

Deanery Synods comprise of both clergy and Lay members who are elected from their parishes. They are jointly chaired by the Area Dean and an elected Lay Chair.

How do deaneries make a difference?

Many deaneries are involved in collaborative outreach and missional activities across a wide range of areas, including Serious Youth Violence, Environmental work and refugee assistance to name but a few. Parishes are able to work together in partnership through their deaneries to make a real difference in their local areas – communities they will understand better than any one else.

What skills do representatives need?

Vision: for Christian faith and discipleship that is flourishing and growing in the wider church — working together.

Commitment: seeking God's will through prayer, listening and studying together, a heart for growth, mission and engagement across boundaries.

Enthusiasm: for speaking and challenging confidently and respectfully, enabling change whilst leading and encouraging others.

Openness: to trying new approaches while learning from others, embracing change and the bigger picture.

Effective communication: including a listening ear and being receptive and open-minded with the ability to share your passion, sharing inspiring feedback to your PCC and wider church family.

It is important that the Deanery Synod, as any representative body, reflects the diversity of our church congregations in gender, ethnic origin, age, experience and church tradition. We welcome and encourage a diverse membership especially as we seek to implement the *Southwark Anti-Racism Charter*.

Christ Centred | Outward Focused: discerning Christ's presence in our context, whilst continuing to turn outward – seeking to support, encourage, resource and learn from one another as we serve our parishes and God's world.
